1. 授業題目: 'A Strange and Marvelous World': Meeting Other Civilizations in European Pre-Modern Literatures

2. Course Title (授業題目): 'A Strange and Marvelous World': Meeting Other Civilizations in European Pre-Modern Literatures

#### 3. 授業の目的と概要 (Course Objectives and Course Description):

The course aims to explore the ways in which European Medieval literatures have described other world civilizations, from the Crusades to the East to the 'discovery' of America. This encounter enhanced the value of new concepts in Western thought and languages, such as the strange and the marvelous, and had a strong emotional and intellectual impact on European readerships.

The course investigates the linguistic, cultural and philosophical changes caused by the pre-modern globalizations by exploring major masterpieces over five centuries of European culture: Saint Brendan's travel, the first travel story through the oceans written in European modern languages (c.11); Marco Polo's famous Travels to Asia (c.13); and Montaigne's philosophical essays about the Amerindians (c.16). Some extracts of works proposing alternative points of view, by the woman writer Marie de France (c.12), the Muslim traveler Ibn Battuta (c.14), and the Swiss ethnologist Jean de Lery (c.16), will be proposed for comparison.

While today's globalization carries the heritage of colonialism, industrialization, and nature exploitation, the course also invites to discover an alternative history of interculturality, by confronting past and present. Postmodern approaches like ecocriticism, global literary studies and decolonialization, are put to the test of premodern literary cultures. The participants are invited to open the dialogue between European Medieval ways and current Japanese/Asian ways to evoke and reflect on the Otherness.

## 4. 学習の到達目標 (Learning Goals):

Three main objectives:

- Understand the ways in which intercultural dialogue and representations of other civilizations evolved in premodern European literatures and become familiar with major masterpieces of Western culture from the eleven to the sixteenth century.

- Compare the pre-modern Western view of the encounter between civilizations with other views from the same period and with Japanese approach to today's globalization.

- reflect on new ways of analysis cultural heritage: ecocriticism; global studies; decolonial studies.

#### 5. 授業の内容・方法と進度予定 (Course Content, Methods, and Course Schedule):

The course is structured in four sessions.

Each session offers three activities to the participants

1/ "Watch and read" (before the meeting): watching videos on historical and cultural context + preparatory reading of sources (available in English and/or Japanese translations).

2/ "Comment" : collective close-reading of extracts.

3/ "Compare and debate" : debating issues raised by medieval texts' approaches of Otherness by comparing them to current approaches of interculturality in Europe and Japan.

Session 1: Encoutering Other Civilizations in arts and literatures, past and present (introduction) Video: "new critical approaches to interculturality: ecocriticism, global studies; decolonial studies". Commented presentation of the corpora and the working methods.

Session 2: Saint Brendan: beyond the Oceans, the Paradise Video: "European representations of the world in the eleventh century" Comment: Saint Brendan: strange sea encounters and marvelous animals Debate: What did and does "strange" and "marvelous" mean?

Session 3: Marco Polo, a Venitian in Asia Video: "Dreams and fears of Asia in thirteenth century Europe" Comment: The Travels: between encyclopedia and autofiction Debate : how to describe asiatic cities? Session 4: Montaigne, a philosopher facing America Video: "The French Brazil, history of a failure" Comment: Montaigne' s "Cannibals", an essay on cultural difference Debate: Who are the "savages" ?

## 6. 成績評価方法 (Grading):

Students are required to prepare for class according to the goal and contents of each session. All materials, videos, extracts, documents will be delivered by Prof. E. Doudet to students on the first course. To validate the course, students are expected to

1/to participate actively during close-reading sessions

2/to bring examples of their choice and to comment on them into the debate sessions (at least one example per student during the whole course).

3/to answer interactive online quizzes proposed during some sessions to check the acquisition of knowledge.

Secondary European modern corpus whose extracts will be provided by the teacher Nicolas Bouvier, The Way of the World (1963) Claude Lévi-Strauss, Sad Tropics (1955) Italo Calvino, The Invisible Cities (1972)
